Kay Alston retired USD 259 teacher and Adjunct Instructor Butler Community College, is an experienced music educator, teacher, director and performer. She has had a variety of musical experiences in the K-12 schools, church, community and Junior Colleges. She loves to sing, prepare music programs, interact with students and other interested musicians and teachers. Kay's programs will engage your students and connect them to a variety of curriculum areas.

Ellamonique Baccus is an art therapist and the Executive Director of Arts Partners in Wichita. She earned her Master's degree in Art Therapy from The School of the Art Institute of Chicago and was a Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor in Chicago for over 10 years prior to relocating to Wichita. Ellamonique is also a professional artist, designing and implementing over 30 Public Art Projects that transform urban landscapes and promote community health through cross sector partnerships. She was trained in Renaissance Oil Painting at the Atelier Neo Medici in Monflanquin, France and received her BFA in Painting from Bowling Green State University. She has worked as an adjunct faculty member at Arkansas Baptist College and Elizabeth City State University teaching Art History and Art Therapy and lectured at Wichita State University. She is a fellow of the University of Chicago Booth School of Business and Chicago Urban League IMPACT program. In 2017, she developed the Wesley Children's Hospital Medical Art Therapy Program in Wichita. She also serves as an appointed member of the City of Wichita Design Council and Arts Council.

Prisca Barnes is the Founder/ CEO, Storytime Village, a nonprofit organization with a mission to serve low-income Kansas children and families. Since Storytime Village's beginning in 2009, she has worked to help underserved children thrive through partnerships that provide early childhood development, family engagement around reading, and access to books. Prisca is especially dedicated to improving the disparities in reading proficiency rates that exist by race and income in her state.

Elaine Bernstorf is a Professor of Music Education at Wichita State University, School of Fine Arts. Elaine received her Bachelor of Music Education, Master of Music Education, and a PhD in Communicative Disorders and Sciences from Wichita State University. As a professor and researcher, Dr. Bernstorf's specializations include elementary vocal music, special music education, early childhood arts education, speech pathology (especially in the areas of voice, fluency, and child language), literacy development, and curriculum development. Dr. Bernstorf is co-author of two editions of the book The Music and Literacy Connection (2004, 2014) published by NAfME (National Association for Music Education) through Roman and Littlefield. She has a book chapter in two publications: Exceptional Music Pedagogy for Children with Exceptionalities International Perspectives (2016) edited by VanderLinde-Blair and McCord; Preparing Educators for Arts Integration: Placing Creativity at the Center of Learning (2017) edited by Diaz and McKenna. She is also nationally recognized for her work with the Organization of American Kodály Educators.

Shawn Chastain is Executive Coordinator of Fine Arts for the Wichita Public Schools, supporting 300 faculty members. Prior to this position, Shawn spent 15 years in the choral classroom at Wichita's Charles Curtis Middle School and Heights High School. Chastain received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Wichita State University where he was a Presser Scholar. In addition to his educational responsibilities, Shawn is in his 23rd year as Music Coordinator/Adult & Youth Choir Director at Wichita's Calvary United Methodist Church, 21st season as Director of the Wichita Choral Society, and 11th Season as ARISE (African Americans Renewing Interest in Spirituals Ensemble) Choral Director. Shawn has also directed WSU's Kodaly Certification Adult Choral Ensemble and the Sedgwick County Jail's Men's Ensemble. Shawn is past president of the Kansas Choral Directors Association, WSU's Fine Arts Advisory Board/Friends of Fine Arts, and past chair of NAfME's Music Program Leaders Advisory Council.

Geli Chavez is a Wichita visual artist and Arts Partners teaching artist. She is the co-illustrator of the children's book, *A Lot of Miles*, with Taylor McQueary and Cydnee Reese. She has a degree in Graphic Design from Fort Hays State University. Geli strives to create work that resonates with many and always with concept in mind.

Denise Colborn is a visionary in the fitness and dance industry. She successfully launched a thriving fitness and dance company that helps clients incorporate exercise and proper nutrition into their daily lives. She also partners with school and community groups where she uses her knowledge to educate others on the importance of a healthy lifestyle and utilizes her art to help students learn.

David Dik was appointed National Executive Director of Young Audiences Arts for Learning in July 2010, the nation's largest arts in education network. Prior to this position, he served as the Managing Director of the Metropolitan Opera Guild, having also served as the Guild's Director of Education. David serves on the Leadership Team of the National Coalition for Core Arts Standards, Board of Directors for the Music-in-Education National Consortium, the Advisory Committee of the Arts Education Partnership (AEP), a trustee and executive committee member of the Potsdam College Foundation and a member of the Harvard Graduate School of Education Arts in Education Advisory Council. David's career began as a certified school music educator. David was recently appointed as a Technical Working Group Advisor for the Statewide Infrastructure Project for Arts Education in partnership with Americans for the Arts (AFTA) and the Education Commission of the States (ECS) and a member of the Windgate Advisory Board for Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville, Arkansas.

Jana Erwin is the Head of Education at the Ulrich Museum of Art at Wichita State University and is responsible for producing the Museum's public and academic programming, including artist talks, panel discussions, curriculum development, guided tours and in-gallery learning experiences for K-12 and college students.

Aaron Fowler is a Nationally Credentialed Teaching Artist with Young Audiences and is a Master Teaching Artist with Wolf Trap Early Learning Through the Arts. He is on the Kansas Arts on Tour roster with the Kansas Creative Arts Industries Commission. He is one of the original artists with Arts Partners joining the roster in 1998. Aaron is also the author of the children book series, *The Adventures of Bella and Choco* series. He currently serves as the President of AFM Local 1000 (Touring Musicians Union).

Joyce Gedraitis holds a Masters in Early Childhood Handicap, degree from Wichita State University. She has danced with folk dance groups all over the United States and in London, England. During the summer of 2009, Joyce went to Israel where she attended a 10-day summer course in Israeli folk dancing.

Jamie Kasper, as director of the Arts Education Partnership, works with over 100 partner organizations to support arts learning across the United States. Prior to joining Education Commission of the States, Jamie worked for Arts Education Collaborative in Pittsburgh and was previously the state arts curriculum advisor at the Pennsylvania Department of Education. Jamie is also an active musician who spends time on the weekends rehearsing or performing with various groups.

Regina Klenjoski is Choreographer, Artistic Director and Founder of Regina Klenjoski Dance Company, a duel-state (CA and KS) arts organization. Recognized by the Los Angeles Times as "a dynamic, graceful and indefatigable presence" she has created 40 works for RKDC in collaboration with numerous national and international artists in music, set design, costume and film. Her work has been commissioned for stage, site-specific locations, film and educational institutions, and for the past 29 years, has been presented throughout Southern California, the Midwest, New York and internationally in Paris and at Festival d'Avignon. Klenjoski's uncompromising dedication to arts education is most notable in the ongoing non-competitive dance education programming she began with the Torrance Cultural Services Division which has seen over 23,000 participants since 1999. She has been an adjunct professor in dance at Wichita State University for the past 6 years, teaching improvisation, modern dance technique and somatics. She is a three-time National Endowment for the Arts grantee, and currently lives, creates, and teaches in Wichita, KS.

Colleen MacGilvray is a museum education professional with a background in environmental education and informal science education. Currently, she works at the Spencer Museum of Art at the University of Kansas as the PEAK Program Coordinator.

Kassie Misiewicz (Artistic Director & Founder of Trike Theatre) is a professional theatre for youth director and educator. Kassie earned her MFA in Theatre for Youth from Arizona State University and a BA in Theatre from University of Notre Dame. Before starting Trike Theatre in 2008, Kassie was the co-founder and first artistic director of TheatreSquared in Fayetteville, AR, Director of Education Outreach at Seattle Children's Theatre and Associate Artistic Director at First Stage Children's Theatre in Milwaukee. Currently, she is a national arts integration consultant with Focus5 and a national teaching artist with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. Kassie loves to travel with her family and have spontaneous dance parties in the kitchen.

Jessie Muret is a Registered Art Therapist and Licensed Clinical Social Worker who has dedicated her career to bringing creative healing to communities. She earned her Master of Science in Art Therapy from Emporia State University in 2004 and her Master of Social Work from Wichita State University in 2011. Throughout her career, Jessie has provided specialized trauma informed services in Art Therapy to at-risk youth & children, survivors of abuse & neglect, sexual assault survivors, human trafficking survivors and has provided treatment for various mental health needs. In 2016, Jessie started Creative Bliss Therapy, LLC, Wichita's premiere Art Therapy private practice and is a proud member of the American Art Therapy Association and the Kansas Art Therapy Association. Since then, she has presented at various professional conferences, workshops and is a Field Instructor for Universities across Kansas as well as a Clinical Supervisor in Social Work approved by the Kansas Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board. Jessie loves creative ventures of all sorts and has a passion for the arts, travel, late nights around the fire with friends & family and nature.

Dr. Chinyere Grace Okafor is a Wichita State University Professor of English and Women's Studies, chair of Women's Studies, and Director of the Center for Women's Studies. Her degrees in English, Theater, and African Studies culminating in her postdoctoral at Cornell University on the poetics and politics of gender inform her research on African masking. Her research on masking is interdisciplinary intersecting African orature, feminist and cultural studies with the organizing principle of masking as art in performance. She has numerous articles in journals and edited volumes including seven on African masking. She has authored eight books including two on masking: Gender, Performance and Communication – African Ikeji Mask Festivals Aro and Diaspora (2017) and Ikeji Festival Theater of the Aro and Diaspora: Gender, Mask and Communication (2015).

Dr. Tasha Parker, PhD, LSCSW, MPA, ACHT, is a Clinical Social Worker and Principal Evaluator for the Institute of Development. Dr. Tasha Parker earned her Master of Public Administration, Master of Social Work and her Ph.D in Community Psychology from Wichita State University. Her expertise is in trauma and resiliency informed systems with special interest in ACEs, prevention, criminal and social justice, and diversity and inclusion. She believes that in order to resolve social problems, we must accurately assess and define all contributing factors.

Adam Payton is the STEAM Education Manager for Arts Partners. He earned his Master's degree in Mechanical Engineering from Wichita State University. Adam holds two Bachelor's degrees one in Mechanical Engineering and the other in Electrical Engineering. He works with professional artists to develop and implement STEAM programs for Preschool-12th grade students that focus on academic improvement and community development.

Sherry Pfeifer began teaching high school English, journalism, and speech in August of 1990 and has been at it ever since. In her 32 years, Sherry has also advised the high school newspaper and the literary arts magazine as well as worked as an assistant debate and forensics coach, a soccer team manager, student advisor, teacher mentor, community volunteer, and dual credit speech instructor at Newman University. Sherry was nominated by her peers and awarded the 2018 Excellence in Teaching Award for Maize High School. She plans to retire from public education in 2022 and continue teaching in the private school sector. She has earned a B.A. in Communication with minors in journalism and speech; a B.S. in Secondary Education with certifications in English, journalism, and speech; and a M.A. in Literature and the English language. She was recently inducted into the Kansas Teacher's Hall of Fame Class of 2022.

Kim Ratliff feels passionately about arts integration as a daily practice in every classroom. Her unique perception comes from wearing two hats simultaneously for three decades: her teacher hat and her performer's hat. During her 30 years as a career elementary school teacher, Kim has incorporated the arts across the curriculum. To do that, she uses concepts developed from 15 years as a teaching artist with Kansas City Young Audiences. As an educator, Kim has been selected to participate in arts integration training through the Kennedy Center and presented at national Project Lead the Way conferences. She received her bachelor's degrees from the University of Kansas and the University of St. Mary and a master's degree in education from the University of St. Mary, where she was on the Dean's List and named Outstanding Senior. Kim was very honored to be nominated as a Shawnee Mission Teacher of the Year. Her background as an artist includes studying at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and the Groundling Theater. While performing in Los Angeles, Kim did theater, commercial and industrial work, but her true love was found in improvisational comedy. Working with KCYA for the past 15 years Kim's dramatic storytelling has been well received and performed hundreds of times. Jennifer Ray is the Associate Director and Associate Professor of Photo Media at Wichita State University. Her photographic work is including in the collections of the Museum of Fine Arts Houston, the Museum of Contemporary Photography, and the Kinsey Institute, and has been exhibited at the RISD Museum of Art, the Chelsea Art Museum, the Museum of Contemporary Photography, Hyde Park Art Center, and Chicago Cultural Center, among other venues. Jennifer's work was included in the *Collector's Guide to New Art Photography*, published by Humble Arts Foundation. 


